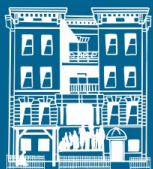

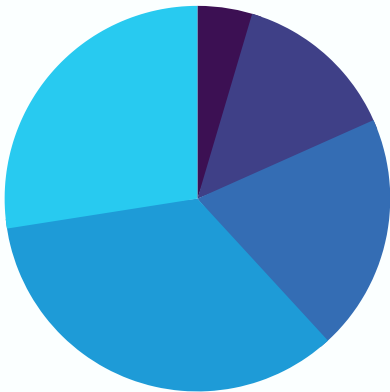

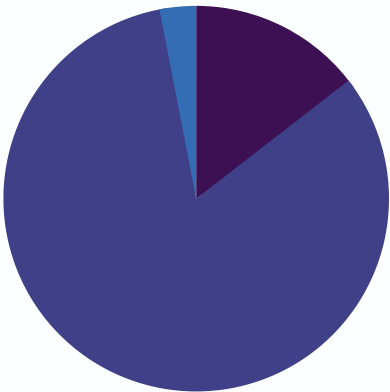

Roy's Story

During the COVID-19 pandemic, Roy was to be discharged on Compassionate Release from federal prison on the condition that he had somewhere safe to go to receive proper medical care – somewhere like Christ House.

When he landed in Baltimore, however, a police officer was waiting to arrest him for a 33-year-old pending robbery charge. Roy's public defender fought to allow Roy to spend his time waiting for the judge's verdict at Christ House rather than jail. After a couple of days, Roy arrived at Christ House.

Roy suffered from stage 4 blood cancer, paranoid schizophrenia, and poor circulatory issues which, when combined with the prison's living conditions, led to Roy losing half of his leg. Based on his medical needs, our case manager provided a written legal statement explaining the real health risks that would result if Roy returned to prison. Roy and his case manager sat side-by-side at Christ House for Roy's hearing, which they joined via video conference. With the help of Roy's public defender and our medical statement, the judge dropped the case.

During his stay, Roy went through a transformation. Our medical staff connected him with a psychiatrist to resume medication for schizophrenia and with a hematologist for his cancer treatments. In addition to protecting Roy from being re-incarcerated, our case managers connected him with Medicaid and Medicare, were able to get him a prosthetic leg, and fought to secure him a bed in a nursing home for long-term care.

Thanks to our compassionate staff and their tireless work throughout the pandemic, patients like Roy have been able to access the care they need at Christ House.

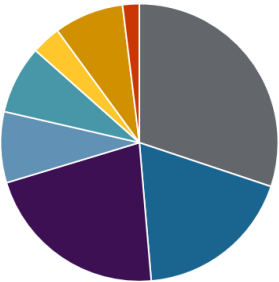

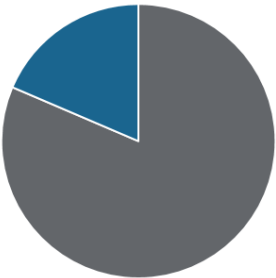

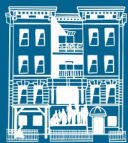
