




PATIENTS WITH A MENTAL HEALTH DIAGNOSIS

MR. LOU'S STORY

For a decade, Mr. Lou had been alternating between staying at the homes of friends and living on the streets. Last year, he had to have bypass surgery on his leg to restore circulation. He had severe gangrene of his toes, a history of peripheral artery disease, a previous heart attack, and pre-diabetes.

When admitted to Christ House, Mr. Lou was initially anxious. As time passed, though, he became more comfortable and trusting of the staff. He moved forward with the necessary amputation of his toes, and stayed in our care while his foot healed, eventually receiving a prosthetic insert to help with walking.

"The care provided by Christ House is superior, nothing comes close. I like watching professionals at work, and they are true professionals. My goal is to walk normally again; they've gotten me out the door, walking, moving. I'm so glad my health is under control."

Our case managers helped Mr. Lou obtain his ID, social security card, and birth certificate. They also assisted him with applying for retirement benefits, and eventually were able to connect Mr. Lou with senior citizen housing.

During his stay at Christ House, Mr. Lou grew to be a mentor for other patients. He participated frequently in patient activities, and was a lively presence in our halls. His recovery in both body and spirit was an honor to witness.
